



What Can You Do... about your Digital Legacy?

Overview

Over the last ten years the internet has changed the ways in which we interact and communicate with one another.

It is important for all of us to understand how these changes have impacted the ways in which we prepare for death and are remembered. This applies to whether we are simply members of the public or professionals whose job it is to advise and support people in relation to dying, death and bereavement.

What is a digital legacy?

A digital legacy is the digital information that is available about someone following their death. Someone's digital legacy is often formed by information that they leave online. This may include any website or blog listings about the person, their social media profiles, photos, videos, gaming profiles and interactions they have had online.

Someone's digital legacy can also be informed by information that is created or co-created by others. This may include interactions that have occurred on someone's Facebook wall.

What are digital assets?

Digital assets are possessions that are purchased, stored or available on digital devices or online services. These may include photos, videos, music, websites, blogs and eBooks.

Where are my digital assets and digital legacy stored?

Digital assets and someone's digital legacy are often spread across two main locations.

- 1) Online services (for example websites, social media sites, emails and cloud services)
- 2) Digital devices (for example, mobile phones, tablets, laptops, hard drives and computers).

When I die who will own my digital assets and digital legacy?

Your digital assets and digital legacy may be owned by you, your beneficiaries and the online services you use. Each online service has its own privacy or end of life policy. It is important to understand the policies for the services that you use in order to know who owns and has access rights to your digital assets and digital legacy.

How can I prepare for death digitally and where should I start?

It is important that each person understands the end of life policies and processes available for each online service and digital device that they use.

How can I get my digital affairs in order?

When making plans for your digital assets that are not of a monetary/financial value please (for example; social media sites, personal photos, videos etc.) we recommend making a [social media will](#). This should only contain non-sensitive information about the accounts you use and what you would like to happen to them and the content they contain. We recommend including digital assets that have financial value within your will.
